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Methodology

This survey, which was conducted online, carries a margin of error equivalent of 3.3% at the 95 percent credibility level. Weights were calculated based on Census and American Community Survey. Gender, age, race and ethnicity, education, income and geography, and issues associated with online propensity were used for weighting.
